After 24 years, Straus retires from State Board of Education.

On Dec. 8, Kathleen Straus of Detroit was honored for her 24 years of service on the State Board of Education with a retirement party hosted by Wayne State University at its Tierney Alumni House.

Straus was first elected to the board in 1992 and served three eight-year terms, including six two-year terms as president.

“Kathie is passionate about education,” Patrick Lindsey, WSU vice president for government and community affairs, said at the event. “Throughout her tenure on the State Board of Education, she has been a powerful

voice for Michigan children and families. Her commitment to justice, inclusion and an excellent education for all students has never wavered.

“Prior to her election, she fought for positive change in our city as an administrator, activist and community leader, working effectively with a coalition of diverse groups from across the city,” he added.
