With ongoing changes in healthcare options for those with reduced or moderate incomes, JFS remains committed to ensuring access to mental and physical healthcare. This past year we were able to assist 937 individuals with healthcare enrollment under the Affordable Care Act, despite the shortened open enrollment period and the elimination of funding. JFS also became a provider under Michigan's Medicaid health plans, allowing us to provide mental health services to Medicaid-eligible community members.

With JFS's resource center fielding the calls, this streamlining will make it easier for those in need to be connected with the appropriate Jewish resource.

Suicide prevention in the spotlight

The Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Detroit launched a community-wide initiative to help youth and families facing mental health issues.

In JFS's ongoing efforts to bring the issue of suicide to the forefront, and with a generous sponsorship from Monni Must and family, we hosted over 300 community members at the Maple Theater for a screening of the documentary, *The S Word*, a film created to open the door to conversation on the subject of suicide. Proceeds totaling \$5,200 went to JFS's A Single Soul Suicide Prevention Initiative. In addition, close to 200 community members have participated in one or more of the suicide prevention trainings offered by JFS.


