What have you most enjoyed about serving on the board?



OLDER ADULT SERVICES

Jewish Family Service is nothing, if not responsive. So when a fire broke out at Baptist Manor in Farmington Hills and displaced residents served by JFS, our staff didn't just step in—they leaped, assessing the needs of those involved and ensuring both the physical and emotional well-being of the residents. They shopped for clothing and other essential items. They found alternate housing. They offered assurances and soothed frayed nerves. And they reunited one cat with its much-relieved owner. Today, they continue to ensure that all of their needs are being met.

Although it was a core team of staffers that did the heavy lifting, the relief they provided would not have been possible without the support of our community. Your continued generosity allows us to make a difference in the lives of so many.

A SINGLE SOUL SUICIDE PREVENTION INITIATIVE

As suicide rates continue to increase, so, too, do our efforts in fighting this devastating epidemic. Through generous gifts from The Anna and Meyer Prentis Family Foundation and the Jewish Women's Foundation, we'll be able to continue offering the awareness and prevention trainings previously funded by The Jewish Fund. Thanks to successful attendance of Mental Health First Aid, ASIST and safeTALK trainings, there are now 126 more people in our community who are prepared to respond to those in crisis.

JFS is also adopting a Zero Suicide initiative that was created by Henry Ford Health System. Zero Suicide is the foundational belief that suicide deaths for those under care within health and behavioral health systems are preventable. This approach incorporates best practices in quality improvement and evidence-based care, and will be integrated throughout our many points of contact with community members.

OHREN JOINS NJHSA BOARD.

JFS CEO Perry Ohren has been named Vice Chair of the Network of Jewish Human Service Agencies, the membership association for the more than 140 non-profit organizations in the U.S., Canada and Israel that provide a full range of human services for the Jewish community and beyond. As a member agency, JFS has had the opportunity for staff to participate in the Meyerhoff Early Career Professional Fellowship and to receive support through Americorps VISTA volunteers. These are opportunities that ultimately benefit those we serve.

REPAIRING HOMES...AND THE WORLD.

As part of Metro In-Home Solutions—a unique partnership with Hartford Memorial Baptist Church, Presbyterian Villages of Michigan and Southwest Solutions—JFS is making its foray into social enterprise. To date, 18 older adults have received home modification services that will allow them to safely remain at home, and another 30 individuals will soon be assisted. In addition to ensuring the safety of more community members, this venture will help JFS maintain alternative sources of revenue when traditional funding sources fluctuate.

Making our work possible

We serve thousands of people each year through more than 30 programs. But we don't do it alone, and we wouldn't be able to do it at all without the generosity of our community. Here are a few of the recent gifts we've received:

The Anna and Meyer Prentis Emergency Fund is named in memory of the magnanimous couple who, throughout their lifetimes, made a tremendous impact on our community. Recipients of their widespread generosity include Temple Beth El, Wayne State University and many other metro Detroit fixtures. Anna was a past president of Hadassah and Meyer was the former chairman of the Allied Jewish Campaign. This fund is one of many ways the family continues to uphold their legacy of service and giving.

The Frank Lazar Memorial Fund was created by Vera and Eric Lev and Colleen and Jeffrey Lev in memory of their father and grandfather, Frank Lazar, a Holocaust survivor whose acts of giving and selflessness inspired the family's philanthropic values. Frank was a Volunteer of the Year, and grandson Jeffrey has continued his legacy of giving by serving as a JFS mentor and board member. Funds support the most pressing needs of the community.


