

My Grandfather Would Have Shot Me.


A Black Woman Discovers Her Family's Nazi Past

The world knew Amon Goeth as the Butcher of Plaszow, a sadistic Nazi commander responsible for the deaths of thousands of Jews (and played by Ralph Fiennes in Schindler's List). Jennifer Teege would come to know him as her grandfather.

It was a discovery she made at a Hamburg library when she was 38-years-old, when for reasons still unknown to her, she found herself drawn to a red book with a black-and-white photo on the cover. The woman in the photo was Teege's biological mother. Although raised in an orphanage and eventually adopted, Teege had some contact with her biological mother and grandmother as a child. Yet neither revealed her grandfather's identity.

Having battled depression for most of her life, Jennifer never understood what was behind her sadness. The discovery of her family's Nazi lineage shed some light on her lifelong feelings that something was wrong. And therapy helped her to reconcile her fond memories of her grandmother with the disturbing truth.

This remarkable and resilient woman will be sharing her fascinating story with us at the JFS Annual Event. Come join us and hear Jennifer's journey from shock to self-discovery to acceptance.

OLDER ADULTS

Eighty-one-year-old Harold is a cancer patient undergoing radiation and chemotherapy who is unable to drive and can't afford a car service. He is just one of the reasons JFS works to help older adults age in place, safely and with dignity. Our transportation department provides approximately 30,000 rides each year to older adults and people with disabilities who, like Harold, would otherwise be unable to attend critical medical appointments.

MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLNESS

Becca is a young mother of four who is divorcing her abusive husband and is worried about the toll the process is taking on her kids. She is part of the reason why mental health services are a critical part of what we do at JFS. Our counselors play an important role in helping people as they cope with life's challenges. We do this through counseling for both children and adults, psychological testing, psychiatric evaluation and many other mental health services.

SAFETY NET

Despite a fulltime job, Dan struggles to support his wife and five children, one of whom has a developmental disability that requires expensive support services. This puts an added strain on the family's already limited budget. But it's because of families like Dan's that JFS serves as a safety net, helping with basic household needs or providing any number of supports during a time of crisis.

Patrice A. knew that raising girls was going to be hard. So she called for reinforcements.

Help arrived in the form of Tammy Kahan and Marlene Lafer, volunteers in Jewish Family Service's Mentor Connection.

Tammy enjoys taking Keniah to places she's never been before, like Eastern Market where the twelve-year-old tried many new foods. "She didn't love everything but at least she was exposed to new things," Tammy said.

Kentrice, whose mentor is Marlene, enjoys having her around. "She's very nice and she tells me the right things to do."

Mentors can make a significant impact in the life of

a youth. Research shows that students with mentors have better school attendance and are 55% more likely to be enrolled in college. Both Keniah and Kentrice have received scholarships to Notre Dame Preparatory and Patrice credits the mentors for the girls' success in school.

Although she had volunteered for her synagogue, Tammy wanted to do something more meaningful. Being a mentor has allowed her to have an impact not only on Keniah's life, but on Patrice's as well.

"Just having an extra person for my girls to talk to has been fantastic," says Patrice. "They say it takes a village to raise a child. Well, I have my village."



