Couple's Legacy Lives on in Fund for Indigent Elderly

Julius and Phyllis Siegel spent 63 rich and interesting years together, admired by those who knew them for their humility and commitment to serving their community. After Phyllis passed away in April of 2013 – Julius passed in 2011– the couple left an estate plan built around supporting causes that motivated them in life.

In 2013, their son, Ronald Siegel, established *The Julius and Phyllis Siegel Fund for Indigent Elderly* at Jewish Family Service. The generous fund will help older adults age with dignity in their homes. It also celebrates the lives of two extraordinary individuals

who cared deeply about the well-being of seniors in our community.

Phyllis Siegel grew up in Detroit, and spent much of her life working to help others. She performed pro bono braille transcription and volunteered at Beaumont Hospital. Phyllis was also a life member of Na'amat, an Israel-based organization devoted to helping women and girls.

Julius Siegel played professional baseball in the Texas League. During World War II, he joined the U.S. Army All-Star Team alongside legends Joe DiMaggio and Virgil Trucks. He later fought to liberate the Philippines.



After the war, Julius launched a successful business, Wolverine Motor Rebuilders. Throughout his retirement Julius was a Meals on Wheels volunteer.

Phyllis and Julius quietly supported many community causes during their later years. Ronald says his humble parents would likely be embarrassed by the attention, but he's proud that their legacy will live on at Jewish Family Service.


Counseling Services

Services for families and individuals include psychiatric evaluation, medication management for addiction,


